165.2024 Power Networks & Rangeford: Haverhill Road utilities work: update

Night Working: Stapleford Parish Council was assured that noise and disruption would be kept to a minimum. This has not proven to be the case. However, there has only been two direct verbal complaints made to the Parish Council, one via SCDC. Facebook has received extensive negative traffic on this issue.

Noise pollution into the early hours was evident at least half a mile from the site, from generators and vehicles.

Light pollution disrupted those local to the site, with properties on Haverhill Road and Gog Magog Way most impacted.

HGVs were travelling through the village to get to the site.

This type of disruption impacts people's health and is unacceptable.

Work was scheduled to finish today, but the road is still signed as closed.

Rangeford advised that work had been compressed to reduce impact on the community, but this has not proven to be the case.

Cllr Milnes commented that Street Works balance this type of working against the disruption over a longer time period and ordinarily it creates little disturbance. Joint Working Group with UK Power Networks and Rangeford: Issues:

As I wrote in our last report in June, "whichever party is elected as the new government, there are likely to be significant changes to the planning regime and other matters dealt with by the District Council." We took the opportunity to highlight some of the policies of Labour (and also the other parties) concerning local government.

The **King's Speech** was delivered on 17th July. A Bill was announced which will include greater devolution powers to local communities¹, giving mayors and some councils authority over skills, energy, planning and transport.

The incoming Labour government has already renamed the Department dealing with planning and local government, now led by Angela Rayner as Secretary of State². New Minister for Housing and Planning Matthew Pennycook was shadow minister throughout the terms of 16 Conservative ministers³, suggesting that there may be a period of greater consistency. Jim McMahon is the new minister for local government.

Angela Rayner is expected to make an announcement shortly on a number of **New Towns**, expected to be taken forward by some form of development corporation. It is not yet clear whether there will be a "new town" to the South of Cambridge rather than merely a larger extension of Cambridge City than proposed in the First Draft of the emerging Local Plan.

Mandatory housing targets for local authorities are to be restored. As Pat McFadden puts it, some local MPs, including his own, would object to specific developments, but local authorities would have power over only where housing was built, not if it was built at all. Keir Starmer pledged at Labour conference 2023 "A Labour government would build 1.5 million homes across the county (over a five-year period) and would establish new development corporations⁴.

Labour seems to be as keen on **Development Corporations** as the Conservatives ⁵, although this was not mentioned in the "kickstarting the economy" section in the manifesto which deals with planning. Some changes to the NPPF – the rules for determining planning consent – have already been made and implemented, particularly on the rules for onshore wind energy, even before the new Parliament first sat.

It is as yet unclear what form any development corporation will take for Cambridge. While Peter Freeman is likely to remain in place as Chair of the growth company, will it then take the form of a "locally-led urban development corporation" as provided for in the Levelling up and Regeneration Act (LURA23)⁶, in which case Cllr Mike Davey, Leader of Cambridge City Council, and perhaps Bridget Smith as Leader of South Cambs would be on the main Board rather than an "advisory council".

In its manifesto, the Labour party says "The current planning regime acts as a major brake on economic growth" and commits to make the changes needed "to forge ahead with new roads, railways, reservoirs, and other nationally significant infrastructure". Labour would make major projects faster and cheaper by slashing red tape, and build support for developments by ensuring communities directly benefit.

Although there was no specific mention of Cambridge in the manifesto, Labour said they would also "update national planning policy to ensure the planning system meets the needs of a modern economy, making it easier to build laboratories, digital infrastructure, and gigafactories". the Planning & Infrastructure Bill promises to increase local authority planning capacity, but "other aspects are likely to cause concern", in particular, a pledge to modernise planning committees ⁷ has the makings of an almighty row", as LGC News puts it.

Rachel Reeves on 9th July highlighted Northstowe in South Cambridgeshire as one of four areas where she wanted to "accelerate stalled housing sites". Northstowe has about 3,000 residents but there are plans to increase this to 25,000 over the next two decades, and the changes may speed up the process of bringing more facilities, such as a shop and GP surgery.

South Cambridgeshire Planning committees:

The South Cambs Planning committee on 10th July had an update from the developer, Homes England, on the proposed design code Northstowe phase 3 (South). Peter Fane sought clarification on the provision of community facilities.

The **Joint Development Control Committee (JDCC)** next meets on 17th June to discuss the West Anglia mainline development at CBC. On the day the Government pledged to speed up development

of major national infrastructure projects, the Joint committee voted to slow it down slightly by rejecting the plans for lighting of the bicycle path across Hobson's Park!

Full Council:

SCDC Council met on 18th July. The Council noted an update on research by Salford and Cambridge Universities on the four day week trial⁸ as well as the usual questions and motions from councillors and others. The four-day week trial has shown net savings of £253,000 pa to SCDC, mainly in reduced cost of agencies resulting from improved recruitment to key roles.

Cllr Milnes General Election results in the County

The General Election was a huge change in national representation and the new Labour Government is in place. Its King's speech will enable us to understand its priorities.

In Cambridgeshire there was also a big shift, with Labour and the Liberal Democrats making significant gains. Locally, South Cambridgeshire, St Neots, and East Cambs all succumbed to the allure of watery stunts and persistent leafletting and returned Lib Dem MPs in all three seats. (<u>Lib Dems celebrate triple win in Cambridgeshire - BBC News</u>) Shelford's new MP, Pippa Heylings, is in the process of sorting out local office space and has already been on the patch attending the Feast.

We already are expecting more devolution, as per early meeting with the Metro Mayors (including our Nik Johnson) introductory letter to Council Leaders from Angela Rayner, and who has also spoken of more "Council Houses and Social Housing" as her priority.

How the new Central Government will deal with the lack of finances, and come up with a feasible fair funding settlement for Local Government, goodness only knows.

As reported previously Cambridgeshire County Council has managed to develop and approve a balanced budget for the year. But it is increasingly difficult to manage, and many Councils around the country are struggling to keep their finances in good order.

"Case for Cambridge"

We have seen the last of Michael Gove in his role as Levelling Up Minister, and his former department has been rapidly renamed to its previous incarnation of Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG).

Everyone is waiting to see what the new Government is going to do with his "plan". They continue to stress how important house building is and have already stated their intention to reform the planning process so that developers don't have to wait interminably for challenges to applications.

Rachel Reeves, the incoming Chancellor, has specifically mentioned accelerating Northstowe, where the build-out rate has been very sluggish.

But the Ministers have said precious little, so far, about the constraints that accompany large developments and how they would tackle them. Water, Transport, Infrastructure still loom large over ambitious housing numbers of 300,000+ per annum.

One of Gove's last actions was to create a Growth Company (as a subsidiary of Homes England) as a pre-cursor to some form of Development Corporation, with possibly no elected representation on it. Both it and the Cambridge Development Group have an uncertain future (if any at all).

Whatever the specific outcome of those deliberations, the Government has declared that it is chasing high levels of economic growth. The Treasury's reliance on its "Golden Triangle" (Oxford-Cambridge-London) to provide a large portion of that growth will continue.

Cambridgeshire County Council meeting

The Council met on 16th July, and received reports on Treasury Management, Constitution & Ethics and Health Scrutiny. Three motions were moved:

- Motion from Councillor Sam Hoy
 Remembrance Sunday is an important part of the annual calendar, remembering veterans
 who have made the ultimate sacrifice as well as those currently serving. Parades require
 road closures which cost approximately £2000. (Sent to Communities, Social Mobility and
 Inclusion Committee with a view to avoid either Town/Parish councils or the Royal British
 Legion from the full burden.)
- Motion from Councillor Ros Hathorn
 In acknowledging that the provision of play and recreational spaces is primarily a district council function, the Council asks officers to:
 - compile evidence of the benefits of play for children and young people in relation to positive mental health and physical well-being.
 - share and promote the evidence with partners across Cambridgeshire, including
 Town and Parish Councils, for local use and to support funding bids or planning
 conversations and bring a paper to the Communities, Social Mobility and Inclusion
 Committee with this evidence.

Parliament

The current session of Parliament has been extended to the end of July, and will recess for the month of August. There are likely to be a large number of Bills in this 2024/25 session, so Parliament is going to be very busy!

A vote of thanks was extended to the officer. Cllr Northmore commented that a gated access is being used in the car park.

Tree Preservation Orders: trees for consideration: ongoing.

Cambridge 2050 & The Cambridge Delivery Group: Cllr H Kettel will meet with Peter Freeman of Homes UK on Thursday, with Gt Shelford PC Chairman Malcolm Watson and CCC Cllr Brian Milnes to discuss local issues including protection of village character without concreting over our important agricultural fields. Cllr H Kettel further commented that it was important that a full exploration of all the pressures on this area be undertaken to ensure that infrastructure and the most appropriate areas for development are carefully assessed without bowing to undue pressure from biotech and other business interests, which have not supplied evidence for current assertions. Cllr H Kettel has produced a plan of the villages as a discussion point. Chatham House rules apply.
